A DIFFERENT GOSPEL II Corinthians 11:1-15

Intro: Sadly---many things done in the name of the Lord are not from Him.

- While seeking to do things for the Lord---in His name---some are actually doing things on their own.
- They see a need or an opportunity---and pour themselves into a ministry to meet that need---assuming they are doing the Lord's will.
- But as we discovered last week---that may not always be the case.
- In fact---Paul gave us several questions to ask of any ministry---including our own---that can help us evaluate whether a ministry is actually from the Lord---or not.
- Is it always comparing?
- A ministry should be evaluated on the basis of what it's doing---and not how it compares to any other ministry.
- Did the Lord initiate it?
- Is it fairly obvious that the Lord opened the door to a particular ministry---or did someone kick the door open---forcing his vision on others?
- Does it overextend itself?
- Can a ministry afford what it's trying to do---or is it unnecessarily duplicating or competing with another ministry?

- Does it grow by itself?
- Is the ministry expanding naturally---or does it take constant promotion to make it grow?
- And finally---does it bring glory to God?
- Or is someone always basking in the glory of what he's doing for the Lord?
- These questions can help us evaluate the nature of a ministry---but they really don't evaluate the nature of the gospel proclaimed by a ministry.
- A ministry can be spiritual in nature---and avoid the pitfalls of being driven by an entrepreneur---but still not be doctrinally sound.
- In fact---as Paul points out in our text for this week---there are some who actually preach another <u>Jesus</u>---offer a different <u>spirit</u>---and proclaim a different <u>gospel</u>.
- So we not only need to evaluate the nature of a ministry---we also need to carefully evaluate the gospel being proclaimed by a ministry.
- Sometimes that's easy to do---and sometimes it's not.
- You don't have to look very far into the beliefs of Latter Day Saints---Jehovah's Witnesses---or Christian Scientists to see that there's a reason they're classified as cults.
- Doctrinal differences between denominations---however----may not be quite as obvious.
- Now---not all differences are theologically significant.
- But some are---so we need to know how to spot a different gospel when it's being taught---and the Corinthians were in such a need.

- They were being taken in by a different gospel---one being proclaimed by the Judaizers---Jewish Christians who sought to make Christianity into a legalistic sect of Judaism.
- And these Judaizers had taken the offensive against Paul---in his absence of course---and against his teaching.
- Now he found himself in the awkward position of having to defend himself by letter.
- He has already made it clear that he doesn't like boasting—but since the Corinthians seemed to give credence to the Judaizers when they did so—Paul felt he had to do the same to make them listen to him.
- So in our text for this morning he begins with a defense of his apostleship---and the gospel he proclaimed.
- And that's fortunate for us.
- Because by examining what he said about himself and the
 way he proclaimed the gospel---we can note some things to
 look for when trying to <u>identify</u> a false gospel---and those
 who might be proclaiming it.
- One of the first things we note is Paul's fear that the Corinthians were being led astray from the simplicity of the gospel---indicating that a different gospel---as a rule---won't be simple.

I. IT WON'T BE SIMPLE II Corinthians 11:1-3

• "I wish that you would bear with me in a little foolishness; but indeed you are bearing with me.

- For I am jealous for you with a godly jealousy; for I betrothed you to one husband, that to Christ I might present you as a pure virgin.
- But I am afraid, lest as the serpent deceived Eve by his craftiness, your minds should be led astray from the simplicity and purity of devotion to Christ."
- Paul begins by apologizing for what he's about to do.
- He's going to have to brag a bit---and he calls that foolishness.
- He also says what he's about to do is motivated by jealousy ---but not the green-eyed kind.
- He's motivated by godly jealousy.
- A jealousy that's not self-centered---but God-centered.
- He's not jealous of their finding another teacher---but of their in reality finding another god---of becoming unfaithful to Christ.
- He's afraid that they are on the brink of being deceived as the serpent had deceived Eve.
- Apparently there were some snakes loose in the church at Corinth---and they were striking at the minds of the Christians.
- And notice the nature of their attack.
- They weren't saying Paul's gospel was too complicated---too hard to understand---and that they had something easier to offer.
- They were---in fact---trying to lead them away from the simplicity of the gospel.

- They were suggesting Paul's gospel was too simplistic--that there wasn't enough to it---that it didn't go far enough.
- That he had been holding back on them---keeping them in the dark.
- They were going to let the Corinthians in on the whole truth ---let them see how things really were.
- But as Paul pointed out---that was the same line Satan used in the garden.
- God told Adam and Eve He had given them everything they needed to enjoy life---and to have a good relationship with Him.
- There was no need for them to eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.
- In fact---if they did---it would ruin everything---their life and their relationship with Him.
- But Satan convinced them God was holding out on them.
- That if they really wanted to be like God---they would have to gain knowledge that hadn't been given to them.
- That's the same thing the Judaizers were doing.
- Apparently they were saying Paul was preaching some juvenile---simplistic faith.
- He was teaching that all you needed to do was believe Jesus died for you---and that if you'd trust Him and let Him live within you---your relationship with God would be secure.
- The Judaizers insisted that wasn't enough.

- They said in order to have a relationship with God you had to know the Law---and follow all the regulations---and customs---and rituals.
- That you needed to follow a schedule of religious observances and practices to convince God of your sincerity.
- You had to do this and not do that---give up this and give up that---learn this and learn that.
- Then---and only then---would you find approval in God's eyes.
- That was the message of the Judaizers.
- And that's usually the message of different gospels today.
- Believe it or not---most people don't like to be totally dependent on grace.
- They feel better if they can think they are <u>earning</u> their standing before God---at least partially.
- So if someone comes along and makes salvation more complicated---tougher to achieve---they're attracted to it.
- It's been said that if God declared that everyone who would crawl one mile over broken glass would be guaranteed eternal life---everyone would do it.
- They would feel as if God then owed them something---or at least as if they'd paid their dues.
- That's the appeal of false gospels---and a characteristic of most of them.
- Now it may be expresses differently.

- They may require the mental gymnastics of Christian Science---the pre-covid door knocking of the Jehovah's Witnesses---or the secret ceremonies of the Mormons---but most will be more <u>complicated</u> than the simple unadulterated gospel of Jesus Christ.
- Very few of them would respond as did Karl Barth---a famous theologian of the last generation---who---when asked what was the greatest theological thought that had ever crossed his mind said---"Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so."
- No---a different gospel won't be that simple.
- And most will have a dynamic spokesperson promoting it.

II. IT WILL HAVE A DYNAMIC SPOKESPERSON II Corinthians 11:4-6

- "For if one comes and preaches another Jesus whom we have not preached, or you receive a different spirit which you have not received, or a different gospel which you have not accepted, you bear this beautifully.
- For I consider myself not in the least inferior to the most eminent apostles.
- But even if I am unskilled in speech, yet I am not so in knowledge; in fact, in every way we have made this evident to you in all things."
- Paul is being a little <u>sarcastic</u> here---especially in verse 4 when he say---"You bear this beautifully."
- He's not praising them for the beauty of their response to a different gospel.

- He's sarcastically commenting on how they've accepted a beautifully presented new gospel.
- Apparently some in Corinth were preaching another Jesus.
- It was the same Jesus of Nazareth---but what they said about Him made Him out to be an entirely different Jesus.
- Furthermore---the message they proclaimed---while being spiritual in nature---wasn't empowered by the Holy Spirit.
- And even though their gospel sounded like good news---it wasn't *the* good news.
- Yet the Corinthians were <u>accepting</u> what these men---who---according to verse 5 were setting themselves up as "most eminent apostles"---had to say.
- And apparently they said it very well.
- By comparison with them---Paul said he was <u>unskilled</u> in speech.
- But then again he did say in I Corinthians that he didn't try to preach with <u>cleverness</u> or superiority of <u>speech</u>.
- He didn't want his message and preaching to be persuasive words of wisdom---but demonstrations of the Spirit and power.
- He didn't want people to listen because he was a flowery orator---nor be moved because he was a dynamic motivator.
- He wanted people to listen because he had something to say.
- And in that department---he adds---he took second seat to no one.

- He was skilled in knowledge---or we should say blessed with knowledge---because the Lord gave it to him.
- And that knowledge was very evident.
- Paul knew the will of God---and he communicated it accurately.
- But he wasn't an ex-officio member of the actor's guild---putting on live performances.
- He didn't want his presentation of the gospel to <u>overshadow</u> the gospel itself.
- By comparison---many preachers of other gospels depend on their <u>style</u> and their <u>skill</u> to gain a following.
- They have charismatic personalities---and generally project well from the stage---so people listen to whatever they have to say---because of the way they say it.
- There's an obvious caution for us here.
- We must carefully examine what the past---present---and future superstars of the religious world have to say---and the way they say it.
- If someone is coming on too strong---we better back off and look again---because he or she may be hiding something very deceptive under that cloak of rhetoric.
- Then Paul brings up the matter of money.
- And by comparing his attitude about support and fundraising---with those who preach a different gospel---one thing becomes obvious.
- A different gospel won't be free.

III. IT WON'T BE FREE II Corinthians 11:7-12

- "Or did I commit a sin in humbling myself that you might be exalted, because I preached the gospel of God to you without charge?
- I robbed other churches, taking wages from them to serve you;
- and when I was present with you and was in need, I was not a burden to anyone; for when the brethren came from Macedonia, they fully supplied my need, and in everything I kept myself from being a burden to you, and will continue to do so.
- As the truth of Christ is in me, this boasting of mine will not be stopped in the regions of Achaia.
- Why? Because I do not love you? God knows I do!
- But what I am doing, I will continue to do, that I may cut off opportunity from those who desire an opportunity to be regarded just as we are in the matter about which they are boasting."
- Again---we have to read between the lines a bit because we have only one side of this discussion.
- But it looks like these "most eminent apostles" who were preaching a different gospel in Corinth had been badmouthing Paul for not accepting money from the Corinthians.
- Verse 12 seems to indicate they wanted to be supported financially---and were claiming Paul wouldn't take anything from them because he knew he had nothing to offer them in return.

- Or he was trying to keep aloof from them---thinking himself too good to take their money.
- Paul responded by asking if it were a sin for him to preach the gospel without charge.
- He had worked hard as a tent maker while in Corinth---and only accepted money from the Christians in Macedonia---so he'd be able to preach to the Corinthians without charge.
- He didn't do that because he didn't love them---but because he did.
- He didn't want anything to stand in the way of their accepting the gospel.
- He was willing to humble himself---to go without---in order that they might be exalted before the throne of God.
- Paul would accept support from those who had become Christians---as he did from the Macedonians.
- But he wouldn't let anyone <u>pay</u> for the privilege of hearing the gospel.
- Now that can easily be contrasted with preachers of different gospels who charge <u>before</u> they let you in on the secrets they've discovered---or rid you of the psycho/spiritual problems you have.
- If you want in on their gospel you have to buy their books--or attend their seminars---or sign over your possessions and
 move into their communities.
- They might even pay millions for advertising during the Super Bowl in order to find new customers---as did Scientology this year.

- Marketing good news for a profit doesn't sound like Jesus' instruction to His disciples in Matthew 10:8 where He said---"Freely you received, freely give."
- But then again---the purveyors of a different gospel aren't disciples of that Jesus.
- When it comes to spiritual matters the old adage about nothing of value being free is reversed.
- If it's not free---you should become more that just a little suspicious.
- The last point Paul makes is that a different gospel will usually look good.

IV. IT WILL LOOK GOOD II Corinthians 11:13-15

- "For such men are false apostles, deceitful workers, disguising themselves as apostles of Christ.
- And no wonder, for even Satan disguises himself as an angel of light.
- Therefore it is not surprising if his servants also disguise themselves as servants of righteousness; whose end shall be according to their deeds."
- Paul doesn't pull any punches when he expresses the true nature of these preachers of different gospels.
- He says they are false apostles---deceitful workers---and servants of Satan---who disguises himself as an angel of light.

- Even <u>Satan</u> can look good---like the old Terry Gibbs' song said about the devil having blue eyes and wearing blue jeans.
- Paul says these false apostles can disguise themselves as servants of <u>righteousness</u>---and the message they proclaim can really <u>sound</u> good.
- And how true that is.
- Different gospels aren't accepted because they look <u>bad</u>---but because they look so <u>good</u>.
- What could appear to be more wholesome and family friendly than Mormonism?
- If you want to really understand how Mormon theology plays out in the real world---you should read John Krakauer's *Under the Banner of Heaven*.
- It shouldn't surprise us how Satan's servants can disguise themselves as servants of righteousness.
- But---sorry to say---many Christians in our pluralistic society are caught off guard by it---and are led away from the simplicity of the gospel of Christ by it.
- We need to be on guard.
- We must expect that some will be preaching another Jesus---offering a different spirit---and proclaiming a different gospel.

- If someone is calling into question the simplicity of the gospel message---building a following on the basis of his charismatic personality or oratorical skills---getting rich off the contributions of people hungry to know what he has to offer---and promising a picture perfect life free of heartache and struggle---you can be pretty sure the gospel he's proclaiming is not the gospel of Christ.
- The gospel of Christ is simple enough for a child to understand---even though the depths of it will never be plumbed in this life.
- The gospel itself will always outshine the one presenting it.
- The gospel is made available without cost---but once accepted it costs you everything.
- And the gospel has a beauty---but it's the beauty of a cross and a sacrificial life.
- If that's the gospel you want---I can betroth you to the Christ who offers it.
- You can come out of the bondage of false gospels and disguised darkness---into the gospel of freedom---gladness and light.
- You can come the Jesus Paul preached---the one I'm privileged to offer to you today as Savior and Lord.
- If you've not done so---now is the time to accept the gospel.
- Now is the time to come to the <u>real</u> Jesus.
